

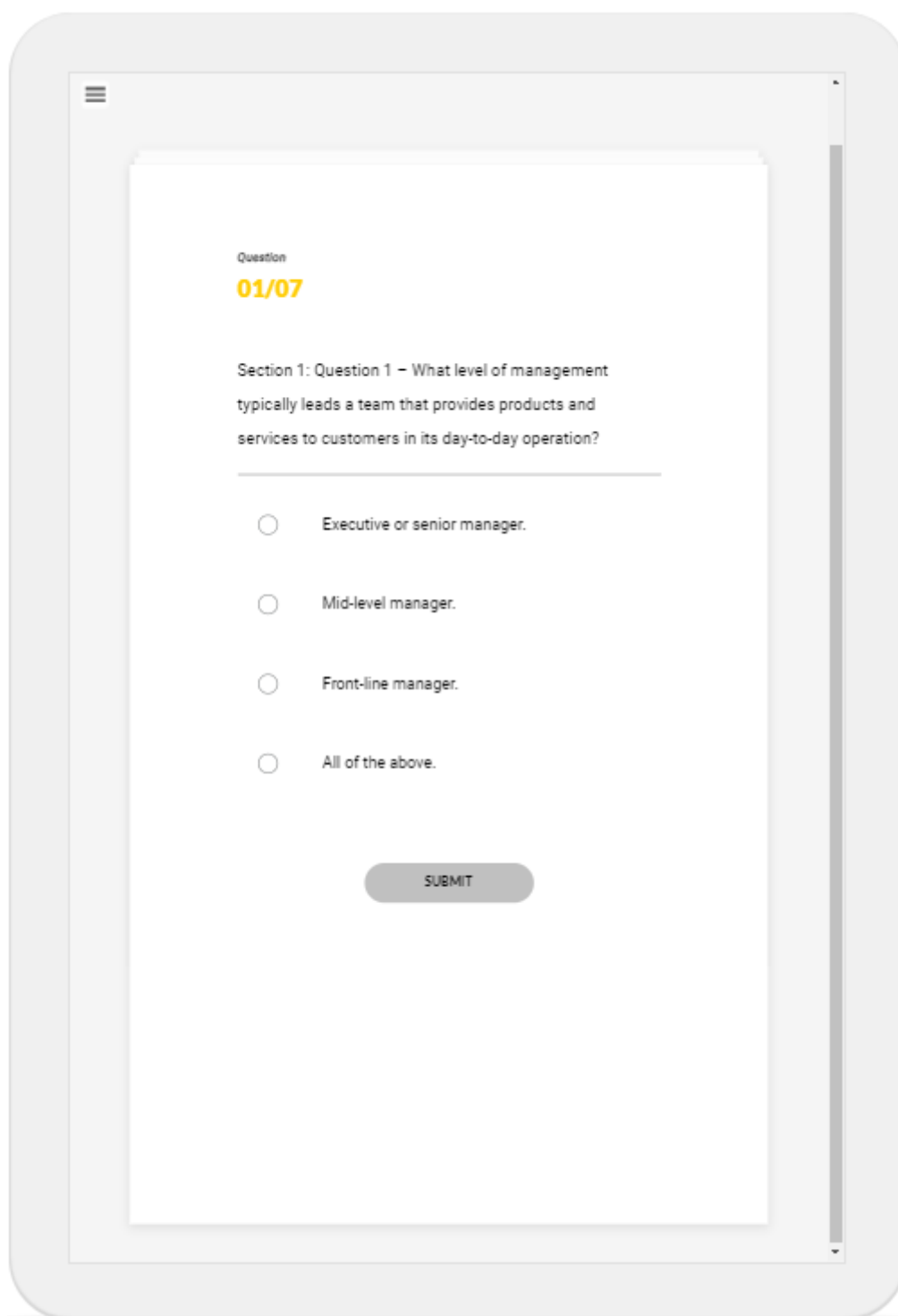
1.1.2 A Manager's Roles

Organiser	+

Coach	+
Leader	+
