

## 1.2 WHS Requirements

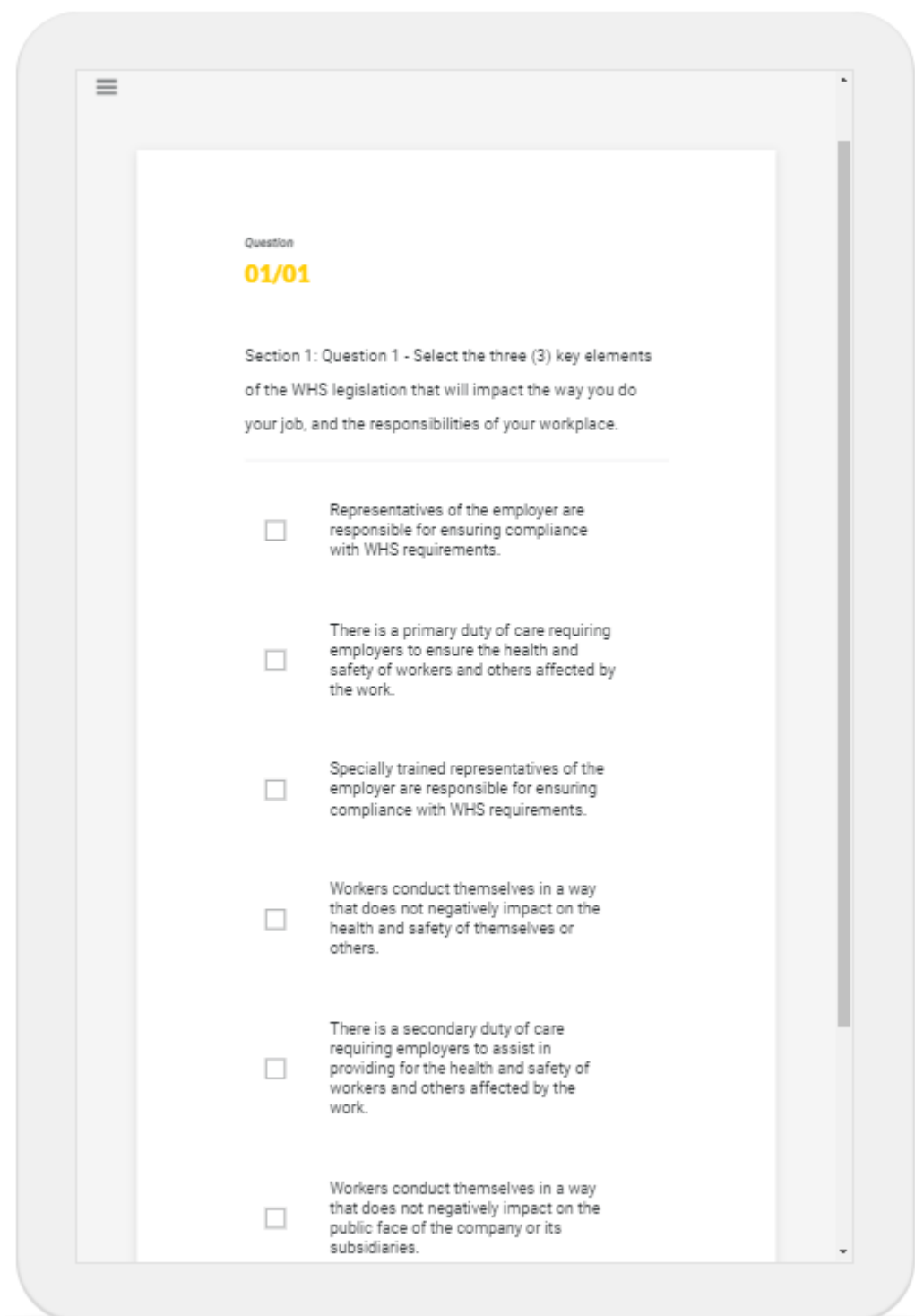
WHS legislation is defined as laws and guidelines to help keep your workplace safe.
